
<u>SYNOPSIS</u>

ABOUT THE WRITER



<u>Steven Berkoff</u> Writer

Writer, theatre director and actor Steven Berkoff was born in 1937, East London. Educated at the Raines Foundation Grammar School, he trained to be an actor at the Webber Douglas Academy in London, and later in Paris at the École Internationale de Théâtre de Jacques Lecoq. In 1968, after working in repertory theatre, he founded the London Theatre Group, working with a group of actors to perform an adaptation of Franz Kafka's story *In The Penal*

Colony. Berkoff has adapted a number of other classic works for the stage, including Kafka's *Metamorphosis* and *The Trial*, Poe's *The Fall of the House of Usher* and Strindberg's *Miss Julie*. He is also the author of many original plays, including *East*, *Decadence*, *Greek*, and *West*.

He is the author of several works of non-fiction, including a volume of autobiography, *Free Association* (1996), and a book of short stories, *Graft: Tales of an Actor* (1998). He also wrote the text for a book of photographs, *The Theatre of Steven Berkoff* (1992). He has written two books of non-fiction, *My Life in Food* (2007) and *Richard II in New York* (2008), which gives an insight into his directing of Shakespeare in the US.His latest play Harvey (2019) deals with the story of Harvey Weinstein.

Ruth trained in acting in Sydney (BA Theatre Nepean), and proudly calls herself a Canberra actor. Previous performances at The Street Theatre include professional productions: *Under Sedation; The Very Sad Fish Lady; Homefront;* and improvised works with

ImproACT (Crescendo, Displaced, Imperson8, North Vs South and multiple Improvention Festival performances. Other performances include: X-Voice Idol (B&C Company) for Canberra Unscripted; Bridesquad and her solo work Proppets (Chrysalis Theatre). Awarded Best Actress 2016 Short and Sweet Sydney Gala Finals, and Best Actress in Canberra Short and Sweet for her one-woman puppet play Baby Blues. Ruth is a resident writer with The Street's HIVE program, and an artsACT grant recipient for development of her new play Under My Bed in partnership with Canberra Youth Theatre and Ainslie and Gorman Arts Centre. Ruth is a proud MEAA Actors Equity member and a Clown Doctor at Canberra Hospital for the Humour



<u>Christopher Samuel Carroll</u> Mr. Samsa

Christopher Samuel Carroll is an Irish theatreartist, trained at The Samuel Beckett Centre, Trinity College Dublin, and Ecole Internationale de Théâtre Jacques Lecoq, Paris. As artistic director of Bare Witness Theatre Company, he creates physical

theatre in ensembles and as a solo performer. Described as "the master of the solo performance", Christopher has built a reputation as a daring and skilled creator of original one-man shows. *Icarus*, written and performed by Christopher and produced by The Street Theatre in 2019, received the 2019 Dance and Physical Theatre Award at Fringe World in Perth. His Butoh adaptation of *Paradise Lost* was shortlisted for the Best Theatre award at Fringe World 2017. Other recent highlights include *The War of the Worlds* and *Tourmaline* (The Street Theatre), playing Malvolio in *Twelfth Night* (Shakespeare by the Lakes), and *Howie the Rookie* (Smith's Alternative). Born and raised in Melbourne, Stefanie trained with Victorian Youth Theatre and performed in their productions including *A Midsummer Night's Dream* and *The Killing Game*. She worked in Greek theatre in Melbourne, and was a part of Cornell University's

Skits-O-Phrenics sketch comedy group in New York. Stefanie's move to Canberra saw her undergo further training with Canberra Youth Theatre, with subsequent performances including the award-winning *SKIN*, *Antigone*, and *poem every day*. Other theatre credits include: Belinda/Flavia in the British farce *Noises Off* (Canberra Repertory Theatre); *I Love Lucy* and *Dreamland* (Short and Sweet); and playing Angela, a 1970s parliamentary hairdresser in *We, The People* (Old Parliament House). Stefanie is thrilled to be making her Street Theatre debut with *Metamorphosis*.





<u>Dylan Van Den Berg</u> Gregor Samsa

Dylan Van Den Berg is a Palawa writer/actor living on Ngunnawal land. His writing for performance includes; *Milk* (First Seen, 2019), *The Camel* (Blacklist Theatre Co.,), *why am i a fish?* (University of New England), and *Blue: a misery play* (First Seen, 2017). This year,

he was selected to participate in Playwriting Australia's masterclass with Patricia Cornelius. As an actor, Dylan has worked with Jigsaw Theatre Company, Gearstick Theatre, and has appeared at The Street in several new works: *In Loco Parentis* by Helen Machalias; *Where I End and You Begin* by Cathy Petocz; and a number of rehearsed readings. Dylan graduated from the ANU with a Bachelor of Arts (Drama) and trained in improvisation at the State University of New York and Upright Citizens Brigade. He is currently completing an MA (UNE) with a focus on Indigenous dramaturgies.

<u>Adam Broinowski</u> Director

Adam Broinowski is an academic, writer and theatre maker. Adam has worked as a director, performer and writer with Australian and international artists and theatre companies since 1994, including as a member of Tokyo-based Gekidan Kaitaisha while a researcher at the University of Tokyo in the 2000s. He teaches in Interdisciplinary Humanities with a focus on Japanese and Asian Studies, Performance and Historical Studies, and critical International Relations. He earned a PhD in modern Japanese history and cultural studies (performance, film) from the University of Melbourne. He published a monograph *Cultural Responses to Occupation in Japan: The Performing Body during and after the Cold War* (Bloomsbury Academic, 2016) and recently completed an Australian Research Council DECRA fellowship entitled 'Contaminated Life: 'Hibakusha' in Japan in the Nuclear Age' at the School of Culture, History and Language at the ANU. Adam is also the co-founder of performance company Social Repair Service with dancer and choreographer Emma Strapps.

Imogen Keen Set and Costume Designer

Imogen is an award-winning set and costume designer for professional theatre production. She has enjoyed a long collaboration with The Street Theatre, including design for: A Doll's House, Part 2; Venus in Fur; Diary of a Madman; The Weight of Light; Boys Will Be Boys; Under Sedation; Constellations; Cold Light; The Faithful Servant; The Chain Bridge; MP; Where I End & You Begin; The Give & Take; To Silence; Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris; Lawrie and Shirley; Albert Herring; Dido and Aeneas. Imogen has received Canberra Critics Circle Awards for Theatre Design (2018, 2011, 2009) and an MEAA Peer Acknowledgement Award (2011). She has worked on a wide variety of theatre, film, music and cross-disciplinary productions for numerous theatre companies. Imogen graduated from the ANU School of Art in 1993.

<u>Kimmo Vennonen</u> Sound Designer

Kimmo Vennonen is a sound designer and audio producer and has run music mastering studio *KV Productions* in Canberra since 1997. In 2010 Kimmo won the MEAA Green Room Award for creative and innovative sound design and in 1991 his work on *Collaborations* with Jim Denley won the prestigious Prix Italia for the ABC. He studied immersive sound in a geodesic dome, becoming an ANU Visiting Fellow in the late nineties. Designs for The Street include: *Icarus; Revolt. She Said. Revolt Again; Cold Light; The Chain Bridge; Where I End and You Begin; Bartleby; All This Living* and *The Faithful Servant.* Other work includes *The Slip Lane* (AITC); *Ghosts in the Scheme* (bigHart); *Collapse, Verbatim, Antigone* (Canberra Youth Theatre); *Blue Roof, The Lost Thing* and *Pearl vs the World* (Jigsaw Theatre). He collaborated with Denise Higgins and Gary Smith on *Vox Nautica* (ANCA); *The Barbed Maze* (CCAS); and *Anthology* (Morris & Buining) at Westlake.

Andrew Meadows Lighting Designer

Andrew moved to Canberra in 2019 to begin work with The Street after a prolific career in Queensland where he worked on many productions for companies including; Expressions Dance, Queensland Theatre Company, OperaQ, La Boite, QLD Conservatorium of Music and Queensland Ballet.

Lighting Designer credits include: Absurd Person Singular; God is a DJ and The Cherry Orchard (Queensland Theatre Company); BAAL (Queensland University of Technology); Summer of the 17th Doll, Post Office Rose (La Boite); The Big Three, Dance Bait, The Sleeping Beauty, St Frances (Queensland Ballet); The Creation, The Food of Love, Dirty Apple, Banjo, Ruddigore (Opera Queensland); The Mikado (New Zealand Opera). He was Head of Lighting Systems on The Lion King in Johannesburg, Head of Systems (Singapore), lighting operator in Taipei (Disney Productions). He also worked as Head of Lighting for the 2018 Auckland Arts Festival.

<u>Lydia Kelly</u> Stage Manager

Lydia graduated from UWS with a Bachelor of Performance, Theory and Practice (Theatremaking) in 2006. Lydia's experience in theatre is extensive, covering Stage and Production Management, Set Construction, Lighting and Sound Design and Operation.
