1906	Samuel Beckett is born in Foxrock, Dublin
1927	Graduates from Trinity College Dublin with a First Class degree in French and Italian
1928	Travels to Paris to be an exchange lecteur at the École Normale Supérieu
1929	Publishes his first short story: Assumption
1930	Publishes the poem <i>Whoroscope</i> . Returns to Trinity College on a two-year contract as a French lecturer
1931	Proust, a collection of essays, is published
1934	Publishes his first novel, More Pricks than Kicks. Moves to London
1937	First attempt at a play: Human Wishes. Settles in Paris
1938	Publishes Murphy. Begins writing poetry in French
1945	Writes Mercier et Camier
1947	First play written in French, <i>Eleutheria</i> , published posthumously. <i>Murphy</i> is translated into French
1951	Molloy in French. Malone meurt
1952	En attendant Godot
1953	L'Innommable. Watt in English. First production of Waiting for Godot
1956	Malone Dies. First British publication of Waiting for Godot

CHRISTOPHER SAMUEL CARROLL

Christopher Samuel Carroll is a professional actor, writer and director from Ireland, trained at The Samuel Beckett Centre, Dublin, and Ecole Jacques Lecoq, Paris. Performances at The Street include *Crime and Punishment; Art; Metamorphosis; Icarus*; and *War of The Worlds / Tourmaline.* As artistic director of Bare Witness Theatre Co., he has produced shows in Ireland, the U.K., France and Australia. Recent work has included the cyberpunk surveillance epic, *I Have No Enemies* (Explosives Factory, Gorman Arts Centre), an alpha-male powerplay about the dark arts of marketing, *Smokescreen* (The Q) a searing solo adaptation of *The Stranger* by Albert Camus (Gorman Arts Centre), and *Plenty of Fish in the Sea* (Clockfire Theatre Co, Sydney Fringe Festival, Edinburgh Fringe Festival). For the last three years, Christopher has been the Lead Artist for Canberra Youth Theatre's Emerge Company.



PJ WILLIAMS

ESTRAGON

PJ Williams is an Actor and Director. Acting credits include: Crime and Punishment: Twenty Minutes With The Devil: A Doll's House. Part 2: The Diary of a Madman: The Faithful Servant: The Chain Bridge: Six Pack: Breathing Corpses; The Give and Take; Without Prejudice (The Street Theatre); The Plan and Other Plans (Hothouse Theatre Co): Late Night Catechism (Adrian Bohm Presents). TV & Film credits include: Home & Away; All Saints; Always Greener; Tricky Business; and Jindabyne; Children of The Revolution; Snatchers (in production) plus numerous commercials. Directing for The Street: Grimm & The Blue Crown Owl (opera): Laurie & Shirley (a play in verse); Lies Love & Hitler; and War of The Worlds. He has been involved with The Street Theatre's Hive Writing and First Seen programs as a workshop director, dramaturge and actor. In 2008 he received the MEAA Actors Equity award for Professional Practice. In 2016 and 2018 the Canberra Critics Circle Award for his performances in *The Faithful Servant* and *Diarv* of a Madman. PJ has worked with ABC Canberra as a freelance media practitioner since 2002. He was a Board Member of the National Folk Festival 2013-2023 and a former board member of The Street. He was a co-founder of Impro Theatre ACT.





JAMES SCOTT

LUCKY

James Scott is an actor, director and teacher. He attained a Diploma of Performance from the Actor's College of Theatre and Television, and a Master of Arts Practice in Acting from Charles Sturt University. In 2009 he and his wife Elizabeth Avery Scott founded the drama school Perform Australia, providing actor training for both children and adults. James has a long association with The Street Theatre, acting in Lies, Love and Hitler; The (Very) Sad Fish Lady; and, numerous developments and workshops. James is the founder of the independent theatre company Honest Puck which has produced many shows including Underneath the Lintel; According to Mark; Anastasia Krupnik; Danny the Champion of the World. His recent acting credits include The Merry Widow with the National Opera, and the feature films Break a Leg and Snatchers (2024).



CRAIG ALEXANDER

POZZO

Craig Alexander is an award-winning actor, writer, film and theatre maker, with a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) in Acting from CSU. Upon graduation he co-founded Riverina based Gearstick Theatre, which he led as Artistic Director for almost ten years, creating a multitude of productions in a variety of genres and honing his character skills with a wide array of roles - ranging from Dracula himself to Pat the Dog. Recent stage performance credits at include: Art; St Nicholas; Exclusion; Venus in Fur; War of The Worlds / Tourmaline; Cold Light; Jacob Marley's Christmas Carol (The Street Theatre); Wolf Lullaby (Echo Theatre); Unprecedented (Hothouse Theatre). Recent screen performance credits include: The Silent Service (Amazon) Murder In The Outback (Channel 7/Beyond); Invited (Berger-Alexander, Best Actor CSFF 2021); The Photographer (The Horse Media, Best Actor CSFF 2019); Dirt (Next In Line Films, Best Actor Fleurie Film Fest 2018); and several national TVC campaigns. He recently completed filming of his comedy/thriller feature Snatchers set for release in 2025.

Sterling Notley has portrayed Macduff in Shakespeare's tragedy *Macbeth*; Roy in Louis Nowra's Comedy *Cosi*; Sterling has also taken part in Musical Theatre with his role as Nathan Detroit in *Guys and Dolls* (Radford Theatre Company), a performance that earned him the lain Sinclair Award for Excellence in Characterisation. Sterling's performances in 2023 lead to him winning the Tony Harris Performer of the Year Award for Drama. Sterling most recently portrayed Food Prep in the world premiere of *Work, But This Time Like You Mean It* (Canberra Youth Theatre).

DIRECTOR

Caroline Stacey OAM is the Artistic Director/CEO of The Street Theatre, Canberra's award-winning arts powerhouse. A multi-award winning director including Canberra Artist of the Year (2012), and the recipient of an OAM in 2022 Caroline has an extensive career as a festival director leading Castlemaine State Festival for seven years and as a stage director of theatre and opera working for companies as diverse as West Australian Opera, Adelaide Symphony Orchestra, Melbourne International Arts Festival, Sydney Opera House, Queensland Music Festival, Victorian Opera, Canterbury Opera, Melbourne Opera, Saltpillar Theatre, and Downstage Theatre (NZ). VERONIQUE BENETT

SPACE, COSTUME, LIGHTING DESIGN

Véronique Benett is a lighting, set, and costume designer. Véronique completed a Master of Fine Art (Design for Performance) majoring in lighting. She also holds a Bachelor of Fine Art (Technical Theatre and Stage Management) from NIDA. She has received four Sydney Theatre Award nominations: Best Stage Design of an Independent Production for Exit The King and Ulster American; Best Lighting Design of an Independent Production for Happy Days; and Best Lighting Design of an Independent Production for John. KIMMO VENNONEN

SOUND DESIGN

Kimmo Vennonen won the MEAA Green Room Award in 2010 for creative and innovative sound design. In 1991 his work on Collaborations with Jim Denley won the prestigious Prix Italia for the ABC. He studied immersive sound in a geodesic dome, becoming an ANU Visiting Fellow in the late nineties. He has run a music mastering studio at Gorman Arts Centre since 1997. Designs for The Street include: Crime and Punishment; The Girl Who Glows; In His Words; Art; Breaking The Castle; Flight Memory; Metamorphosis; Icarus; Revolt. She Said. Revolt Again; Cold Light; The Faithful Servant; The Chain Bridge; Where I End and You Begin; Bartleby; and, All This Living. Other work includes The Slip Lane (AITC); Ghosts in the Scheme (bigHart); Verbatim; Antigone (CYT); Blue Roof; The Lost Thing; and Pearl vs the World (Jigsaw Theatre).



ASHLEE BYE

MOVEMENT CONSULTANT

Ashlee is an independent dance artist based on Ngunnawal County with strong interests in site-specificity and improvisation. She celebrates collaboration and the communicative potential of human movement to transform space and speak to diverse audiences. Her work often experiments with playful, non-traditional modalities to explore concepts of place, communication and memory. Since graduating from VCA Dance, Ashlee's independent collaborations have seen her create and tour works across Australia and New Zealand. She co-developed and led the dance program at Penleigh and Essendon Grammar, choreographing nonconventional performances and musicals for six years. Ashlee has performed in several works with Australian Dance Party, including Hillscape at the Arboretum, which she choreographed for the 2023 Canberra International Music Festival. As resident artist at QL2 Dance, she is researching methodologies for nourishing creative practice, and the first iteration of her new work Implications was included in You Are Here's 2023 Cahoots Lab.
